## REFLECTIONS AND LOOKING AHEAD

I want to take a moment to express my deepest gratitude for your continued support and generosity. Below are highlights from 2024 and some of our plans for 2025.

This past spring, the Center launched the Women in Leadership Forum, and the inaugural speaker was Dr. Carolyn Jefferson-Jenkins, the first woman of color to lead the League of Women Voters. Overall, our talk themes centered around democracy, poverty, education inequality, mass incarceration, affordable housing, and happiness. In the spring, the Clough Colloquium featured Nobel Laureate Nadia Murad, who shared her harrowing story of surviving human trafficking by ISIS and her fight to end this global issue. The Chambers Lecture featured the former mayor of Stockton, CA, Michael Tubbs, who discussed how universal income can uplift impoverished communities. At the Brennan Symposium, Dr. Ethan Kross, a professor at the University of Michigan, shared insights and tools on how to manage the chatter in our heads and channel our inner voices to make sound decisions. The Center also collaborated with the Shea Center for Entrepreneurship to bring shoe designer and founder Stuart Weitzman, who shared his lessons in leadership. Alumni Bernard Kim '98, CEO of Match Group, and Reba Hatcher '16, chief commercial officer at ButcherBox, inspired students at the Lunch with a Leader and the I Belong luncheon series, respectively.

In the fall, the Clough Colloquium featured BC Professor Heather Cox Richardson, author of *Democracy Awakening: Notes on the State of America*, who spoke about the impact of female voices in the history of America's democracy. The Jane Jacobs Lecture, cosponsored with the Joseph E. Corcoran Center for Real Estate and Urban Action, featured Ed Augustus, Massachusetts Secretary of Housing and Livable Communities, who spoke about the state of affordable housing in the Commonwealth. In collaboration with the Lowell Humanities Series and the PULSE Program, Dr. Reuben Miller, professor at the University of Chicago and author of *Halfway Home: Race, Punishment, and the Afterlife of Mass Incarceration*, talked about the systemic and unequal treatment of mass incarceration

in America. In collaboration with the Pine Manor Institute for Student Success, we hosted Dr. Anthony Jack, a professor at Boston University, who shared his research on how Higher Ed fails our first-generation and low-income students. The **Forum on Ethics** featured Arthur Brooks, a professor at Harvard University, who shared his philosophy on the importance of cultivating happiness in our lives and leadership journeys. The Women in Leadership **Forum** featured Zoe Bogan, who shared her journey of transitioning from corporate success to entrepreneurship and funded scholarships for two students to attend a women's conference in NYC. The Lunch with a Leader speaker was Kansas City Royals' Senior Vice President and Chief Operations Manager Jason Sinnarajah '02, who talked about taking risks and pursuing dreams. The Ethics and Lunch session featured Phil Coupe '90, P'27, '27, the co-founder of ReVision Energy, who talked about the ethical benefits of solar energy. The **Social Impact & Lunch** program featured Kate Bennett, former CEO of the Boston Housing Authority, who spoke about the Commonwealth's housing crisis for low-income populations. The newly launched Ambassador Series featured Drew Hession-Kunz, a Seidner Department of Finance lecturer, who shared insights with students on developing startups.

Looking ahead, the upcoming spring brings exciting events, including Admiral James Stavridis (ret.), the 16th Supreme Allied Commander of NATO, at the Clough Colloquium, and Barbara Pierce Bush, co-founder of Global Health Corps, at the Chambers Lecture. The Brennan Symposium will feature Luma Mufleh, a dedicated advocate for refugee and immigrant education.

As we prepare for 2025, we remain committed to creating an even greater impact. With your continued support, we will build on these successes to inspire and empower our community.


Jenks Class of 2025: Twenty-seven students were selected for the Jenks Class of 2025, representing 15 states, and the United Kingdom.

### STUDENT GRANTS

Summer grants were awarded to students who participated in unpaid summer internships at various organizations focusing on healthcare research, education advocacy, governmental communications, legislative and public policy research, United Nations mobilization, and work at the Jesuit Historical Archives in Rome. Travel grants were also awarded to students who participated in opportunities that supported their career interests, including global healthcare, Artificial Intelligence, filmmaking, faith and ethical leadership, and education research. Six students also received a grant to attend the GenHERation Discovery Days program, which connects young women with female leaders from Fortune 500 companies, tech giants, government agencies, retail, the sporting industry, and other companies for networking and mentorship opportunities.
